Brief History of Maine State DKG

Seven women educators gathered in Orono, Maine, on September 19, 1942, where they met with Dr. May B. Allen, the corresponding secretary of the national educational organization of Delta Kappa Gamma. Dr. Allen introduced the vision, mission, and goals espoused by Miss Annie Webb Blanton, president of this nationwide group of women educators. It was at this meeting and under the leadership of Dr. Allen that Alpha Psi State (Maine) of DKG International was born. In 2018, the name was changed to the Maine State Organization of DKG International.

Founded on May 11, 1929, in Austin, Texas, this international educational group was organized "to promote professional and personal growth of women educators and excellence in education."

The mission of Maine State is identical to that of the national group and is uniformly aligned through 14 local chapters—each covering a particular geographic region of Maine. While each chapter's basic structure adheres to our state and international governance, the chapter also responds to the needs of the educators it serves.

All across our state, Maine State has active and retired members who are aware of the needs of our current educational system. We join together to do everything we can to provide professional development opportunities for our teachers.

In essence, membership in Maine State and the local chapters provides "great fellowship of those who are working together to bring honor and prestige to the profession of teaching."
