s Chair of the Educational Excellence Committee, I would like to remind you of this year's areas of focus. These are all considered equally important, and they are based on the Society's strategic plan.

They are:

- 1. Supporting Early-career Educators (SEE)
- 2. Schools for Africa (SFA)
- 3. Promoting UN activities and the Committee for Teaching about the UN (CTAUN) and
- 4. Empowering women to take leadership roles.



In addition, the EEC is concerned with the Arts, various programs and projects, and being informed about legislation that deals with educational issues. Information and blogs full of ideas concerning all of these EEC topics can be found on the DKG International's website. Be sure to explore these great resources!

Many chapters reach out to new teachers at the beginning of the school year. It would be beneficial to make contact with early career educators throughout the school year. These novices need support and gestures of appreciation to bolster them through the many challenges a school year brings. If your chapter has not given a thoughtful communication or small gift to your area's newest additions, please do so now.

I have previously advocated that chapters participate in a simple fundraising project for SFA Schools for Africa called "Change for Change." Members each keep a collection container at home and deposit loose change in it on a regular basis. Prior to Spring Convention, members should bring their collected funds converted to a check or paper money to a chapter meeting. The chapter could then bring the collected monies to Spring Convention in a check made out to Maine State Organization of DKG International with "Schools for Africa" in the memo line. Each chapter that participates in this activity will be recognized at Spring Convention. Chapter presidents were sent an

recognized at Spring Convention. Chapter presidents were sent an extensive list of short videos about Schools for Africa last fall. These could be used in a meeting to inform members about the impact of the program.



Has your chapter shared information with area teachers about the free curriculum materials from the United Nations on the CTAUN website? Perhaps you could use a chapter meeting to explore the resources first. Visit https://teachun.org.

Most chapters have a need for more individuals to take on leadership roles. Be sure to send incoming chapter officers to the state 's leadership training to be held on **May 21**st (see below) but also consider sending additional members to get acquainted with the responsibilities of different roles. Reach out to members to take on a specific task or to do some job shadowing with an officer. Try to grow leaders within your chapter. Invite and empower some of the less involved members to help.



ncorporating art and music into some of your meetings will definitely enrich your programming. Have members share their talents. Find out what education-related legislative issues are of concern to your members. Plan at least part of one or more meetings to become informed about the topic and to discuss it. Creative, varied programming can make your chapter more appealing to prospective members.

If your chapter was not able to touch on each of these areas of focus this year, keep them in mind as you plan next year's programming. Perhaps you could focus on one or two areas and incorporate the others to a lesser degree.

Introducing Cathy P. Daugherty

First, a few personal remarks from your state president – At my first international convention in Nashville 2016, I well remember Cathy's receiving the International Achievement Award. Her address spoke to life beyond one's DKG chapter, which had particular meaning for me at that time. Then, on the Convention floor in Austin 2018, when we had all those amendment proposals to handle, I was wowed by Cathy's knowledge and efficiency – she's a magician! To cap off that Austin experience, Cathy was installed as our International President and gave an impactful acceptance speech on the evolution, momentum, and transparency needed to move forward in DKG. Her "Making My Bed in Austin" session at the International Conference 2019 in Connecticut was personal and informative, giving me a glimpse of the daily challenges and rewards of being the International President.

Over these past several years, Cathy's contributions via publications and emails have supported my own leadership journey. I am "tickled pink" that she will be joining us at our Spring Convention.

Cathy P. Daugherty currently serves DKG as its Immediate Past International President and as a Director on the DKG International Educators Foundation. Daugherty has been member of Alpha Chapter in Virginia since 1989. She is the 2016 recipient of the Achievement Award, the Society's highest honor. She has held leadership positions at the chapter and state organization levels serving as Virginia State Organization's editor (1997-2003),

president (2003-2005), executive secretary (2005-2008), and parliamentarian (2015-2018). Daugherty serves as Rules Committee chair this biennium and is leading a review of all chapter rules in the state organization.

At the international level, Daugherty has served on the Administrative Board in her current position and as International President (2018-2020) during the sale of the Society's HQ in Austin, First Vice President (2014-2016), and Southeast

Regional Director (2008-2010). Earlier she chaired the Educational Excellence (EEC) and Professional Affairs Committees and served as a member of the Program of Work and EEC. Daugherty chaired the Administrative Board subcommittee charged with proposing the Society's first international project. She was point-person for the Schools for Africa project from its official adoption at the 2010 International Convention through July 2014, authoring all issues of the SFA Newsletter. During 2016-2018 Daugherty chaired the Constitution Committee and was charged with presenting proposed amendments to the convention membership in 2018. She is a frequent presenter, trainer, and Society representative to state organizations, regions, and chapters.

Daugherty retired from her nine-year position as a part-time Latin instructor and supervisor of Latin student teachers at Randolph-Macon College in Ashland, Virginia in 2016. She retired earlier in 2007 after a 35-year public school career that included work as both a teacher and a supervisor for World Languages.

She maintained a presence in the public school setting through school year 2014-2015 as mentor to beginning teachers and reader for the Scholarship Committee of the National Latin Exam (NLE). Each Monday she can be found reading to a kindergarten student during lunch at the local elementary school in her neighborhood. Daugherty has written professional articles, contributed to foreign language scholarship as a chapter author, and made numerous presentations on classical subjects, especially those relating to pedagogy and teacher training.

<u>For the residents:</u> coffee, creamer, sugar, paper plates, bowls, cups, plastic forks, spoons, knives, paper towels, toilet paper, towels, wash cloths, blankets and pillowcases. You might also consider children's book and toys.

<u>For the shelter:</u> cleaning and laundry supplies, disinfectant spray and wipes, copy paper, batteries AA, AAA, 9v, garbage bags, gift cards to local grocery stores such as Graves', Shop'n Save, Hannaford, Star City IGA, and hardware stores, S.W.Collins, Lowes, and Rathun Lumber Company. There is also a Wish List on Amazon.com. Search for Homeless Services of Aroostook.

- 7) S-T-R-E-T-C-H. This is by no means a complete list, but you get the idea.



THETA CHAPTER NEWS

Theta has had a busy year so far. We met monthly from September through December and again in February. We plan to meet monthly from March through May and will do a chapter outing and lunch in June. We also may schedule a planning meeting in the summer to create a blueprint for next year's programming. That worked well for us last year. Since we have been unable to meet in schools as had been our custom for years, we have been meeting at the General Bryant E. Moore Community and Conference Center in Ellsworth at a low cost because of our nonprofit status.

The fall was a whirlwind of activity as we finalized plans for meeting our responsibilities as host chapter for the Fall Workshop. We actually had started gearing up for this last winter, determining who would create the table decorations, the table favors, and place cards; who would man the registration and hospitality tables, what foods we would provide for the hospitality table, and so on. For our Early Career Educators project, we prepared "welcome mugs" for 30 new teachers in the Ellsworth, M.D.I., and RSU 24 schools. Each mug contained chocolate, a Dairy Queen gift card, and information about DKG. For Schools for Africa, President Priscilla McFarland presented several short videos that showed how this collaboration between the United Nations and DKG is impacting students. She then encouraged members to participate in the "Change for Change" project by collecting coins in a container and bringing them to a spring meeting as a donation for SFA.

Theta has two new community service projects this year. Some of us have been volunteering weekly at the Community Closet, a wonderful organization that provides free or low cost clothing, free food, free items for fire victims, and back to school clothing and supplies. It also distributes Christmas gifts to hundreds of area children.
