Promising Pathways to Building Membership

I am delighted to be your membership chair in my new role as second vice president of our state organization. I realize that I have big shoes to fill since my predecessors did such splendid work.

I want you to think positive when it comes to recruiting new members to your chapter. While the membership numbers in our state have dramatically declined from 599 in 2012 down to 424 in 2018, there's no need to panic. This data merely gives us a wake-up call to action. Since the rules for membership eligibility are more flexible these days, the good news is that we have a significantly bigger pool of potential members from which to draw.

Did you know that eligibility for membership in DKG has been greatly expanded? That is because International has extended the definition of educator to include anyone who provides training as part of her paid position. So a nurse, librarian, or a banker who teaches classes or a supervisor who trains workers is a potential inductee. When seeking prospective members, "think outside the classroom."

Chapters are free to induct someone who is no longer teaching but still has a strong interest in education. So retirees may be welcomed into your chapter.

Does your chapter include paraprofessionals among its members? These worthy educators may be an untapped resource.

In addition, collegiate memberships hold promise to increase our ranks. An education student who is in her third or fourth year or is in graduate school may join. You may want to reach out to any institution in your area that offers a degree in education to spread the word. The rules for collegiate membership may be found on our state organization's web page under "Resources." <u>Go to dkgmaine.weebly.com.</u>

How diverse is your membership? Bringing in women of differing age spans, ethnicity, job descriptions, and so on can significantly enrich your chapter.

Of course, your chapter decides who it wants to invite for membership. Keep in mind, if you are going to include educators who have a non-school role, make sure you will be providing programming and activities of interest or relevance to them, not just ones geared to classroom teachers. Community service projects have the potential to unite a diverse membership.

Are you familiar with the 10 year plan for recruitment? Members reach out to women who are in the age group one decade below theirs. (Someone in her 50's contacts those in their 40's; women in their 40's reach out to those in their 30's, etc. The idea is that it may be easier to relate to someone who is closer in age to you. Over time, this method has the potential to add increasingly younger members to your chapter.

Did your chapter develop elevator speeches last year? If you did, I recommend that you review and tweak them, and most importantly, practice delivering them! If you didn't create them, now is the time to do so! At the training in Des Moines, we practiced our 30 second pitches in two circles, inner and outer, facing a partner. After each partner had a turn, the outer circle rotated one place to the left, giving an opportunity to practice with someone else. We did this repeatedly, with a timer. If you would like more details about this activity, e-mail me.

Remember, every member is responsible for recruitment and mentoring. Use your elevator speech to start the conversation about DKG and your chapter. Since we are not a secret society, inform people about our organization. Ask people if they want to join.

The Chapter Membership Chair, with the assistance of the chapter's president and other members, should develop and implement a plan to recruit new members and to retain both new and seasoned members. It should include a meeting schedule with engaging agendas. The plan should include a way to keep dropped members in the loop with the goal of reinstating some of them. It should have goals and a timeline with dates. The plan should be assessed periodically.

Use the resources at dkg.org. to help with your membership efforts. Under "Tools," go to "Chapter Tools," and you will find a recruitment plan as well as a new member kit, retention materials, and many other resources. Each chapter should have a copy of the "Bright Ideas" booklet to find out what strategies other chapters in our state have used. If you don't have one, let me know, and I will see that you get one.

Must-Do's

As the membership chair for our state organization, I need to emphasize that there are several MUST-Do's that each chapter's president and/or membership chair (second vicepresident) must accomplish. These tasks are essential for keeping our records up-to-date and for ensuring that we provide our members with appropriate recognition at certain milestones.

Immediately upon the death of a member, send Form 6, Report of the Death of a Member, to me, to our Treasurer Kathy Sticht, and to International headquarters.

By February 1st, send Form 2, Annual Necrology Report, to me for each member who has died this year between January and December. You may also send one later for anyone who died after the end of the year, but it may not be possible to include those members in the 2020 necrology. If not included, they would be memorialized during the following spring convention.

By April 1st, send the names of chapter members to me who have been members for 40 years and also the names of those who have 50 or more years of membership so that they can be acknowledged at spring convention.

It is strongly recommended that your chapter's membership chair attend her training session at the fall workshop in Belfast on October18-19. If she can't attend, a representative from your chapter should attend.

It is vital that the membership chair attend her training session (further information TBA) at Fall Workshop. If she can't attend, a representative from your chapter should attend. Last Words....

Please let me know if you have any questions or need any resources to help with your membership initiatives. I will try to provide you with the information or materials that you need or point you in the direction to find them. I look forward to connecting with you in the near future.

Read to Me Goes to School

Thirty years ago, Barbara Randall and Adele Silverman of Mu Chapter created the Read to Me service project. Founded in the belief that early literacy is critical to develop overall literacy, the Read to Me project provided children's books and a brief newsletter containing information to new parents about the importance of reading to newborns and toddlers. The newsletter also gave helpful tips about reading and provided contact information from the local libraries and social services. For thirty years, every parent of an infant born in either of the two Lewiston hospitals received our books before they took their new baby home. We, as a group of teachers, loved the Read to Me project.

However, over the years, times and resources have changed. Even though the new mothers enjoyed our little book packages, newer book programs with more resources began to send similar books and information to the area hospitals. New parents were still receiving books for their newborns, just not our books. The time had come to revamp our beloved Read to Me project.

Nancy Hinds led the path forward by evaluating where the strongest needs for literacy support existed within our local community. She identified two elementary schools with the highest percentages of at-risk students by looking at published numbers for free and reduced lunches in the student population. Then, following the foundational belief of the importance of early literacy, Nancy contacted the preschool teachers in those schools. Our project started small by working with the teachers and providing age appropriate books for use in the classroom. The students would be able to take home the books to create their own home library. The teachers were delighted with the idea, and used the books with great success in the classroom. Last year, the Read to Me Project sent 450 books home through 4 preschool classes in 2 schools. Children were delighted to own a book and to take it home. These simple books also were accessible for adult new English language learners to be able to read to their children, building literacy at home as well as at school.

This year, we will take our Read to Me project one step further. In addition to providing books for the classroom, we will be inviting DKG members to become guest readers in the preschool classrooms. This helps to bring more of our Mu Chapter members back in touch with the Read to Me project's lofty goals and to model to our young school children that there is a whole wide world of books to explore through reading. Many studies document that simply reading to children had help to bridge the "Million word gap". A million words is the calculated difference in word knowledge between children who are read to and those who are not. By reading with the preschool children on a monthly basis, we are helping to build vocabulary, support pre-reading literacy skills, and share our own love of reading which helps all students succeed and thrive.

We are very excited for the school year to begin and to be able to take Read to Me back to school.
