All the members of each chapter in attendance will have a group photograph taken. Jean and Alfreda will also be taking candid photos the entire weekend, as well as the ones we usually take of incoming and outgoing officers, achievement award winners, etc. Under Karen Hawthorne's and Rena Kearney's direction, our Alpha Psi Chorus will perform several songs during the Banquet. Be sure to sign up if you love to sing and attend the scheduled rehearsal. Before the Banquet and Installation, I have arranged for a Cash Bar to be set up. In the fall, I surveyed the Administrative Board and the majority were in favor of adding this to our celebration, as they do at International. Meet Carolyn Pittman, Our International Guest



Carolyn Pittman, 2015-2018 international president, grew up in Texas, the third of six children. She graduated from the University of Arkansas where she was a member of the Student Senate and the president of the Women's Interhall Council and the Association of Women Students where she met her husband. Carolyn received her master's degree in journalism from the University of Mississippi. After college, she taught junior and senior English and journalism in eastern Arkansas and Little Rock before moving on to the Arkansas Department of Education as a curriculum specialist. Her husband is a retired appellate court

judge. Together they have two sons and a daughter and seven grandchildren who live in Arkansas and Colorado.

Before becoming president of DKG International, she served as international first vice president, member-at-large, Southeast regional director, and chair or member of several international committees. She was the 2015 recipient of the Society Achievement Award. As president, Carolyn represents the Society at state organization events, chairs the Administrative Board and the Executive Board, and is a participatory member of all international committees except nominations. Her goal is to help state organizations—and individual members—realize their power to impact educators' awareness of their potential to make a difference with their colleagues and their students.

Carolyn was Arkansas state organization president, first vice president, editor, and executive secretary. She is an Arkansas Achievement Award recipient. She led the collaboration on a project to create and publish an Arkansas literary map, chaired the rules committee that revised the state bylaws, and participated in training state officers, committee chairs, and other leaders. She was president of two chapters and a "dismal" treasurer of one.

She enjoys performance arts, reading, spending time with family and friends, and solving puzzles. Carolyn said that she is not a singer, but has been in community theatre, four musicals and several plays. The one part she always wanted to play and was never cast for was Ousier in *Steel Magnolias*!

Celebrating our 75th Supreme Birthday as a member of Alpha Psi brings with it a sense of pride for Alpha Psi's promotion of education in the State of Maine for the past 75 years. It also makes us reflect upon who we are and what we can become. The above quotation is from those written at Fall Workshop by the Executive Board members to reflect upon the following: Write a statement as to why you either became a member or why you continue to be a DKG member. As I compiled the thoughtful testimonials, I began to realize a few important truths about our organization of key women educators. Here are a few of them for you to consider:

- ① Many of us joined because a family member or a fellow teacher that we held in high esteem were members. We were honored to be part of this amazing organization.
- ① Others of us joined because we believed in the purposes of DKG to honor women for their contributions to education, to unite and support each other in genuine spiritual fellowship, to stimulate and promote professional and personal growth, to inform members of current issues in education and legislation, and to help teachers further their career paths by awarding scholarships.
- We stay members of DKG because of the friendships we have made and the many opportunities that DKG offers for both active and retired teachers. Some of these include the quality professional and personal

growth programs we provide, an opportunity to travel, the networking that our meetings provide, the projects our chapters support, and above all the connections that we have made with other enthusiastic educators.

As I read all of these, I began to think more closely about my own reasons for joining DKG and staying a member. I joined as many of you did because of an educator that I admired. And now as State President, I have traveled to three Northeast Regional Conventions and this summer, I will attend my second International Convention. I can't tell you what a thrill it was for me to be in a room filled with 2000 passionate educators! It felt good to realize I was part of the powerful, strong group of women who love what I do – teaching.

Sheila Cochrane is taking a graduate level class called "Comprehensive Intervention Model," (CIM), to help bring the most effective interventions to young learners at Newport/Plymouth Elementary School.
