At times I have felt like I was treading water or swimming upstream. I appreciate all the support I have received from the officers, committee chairmen and members in general of Maine DKG. It has made this job enjoyable in spite

of all that is going on. Having to cancel in person meetings has been hard on us all. However, we were able to hold a very successful fall convention using Zoom. The World Fellowship raffle brought in over \$700.00. Chapters have continued to stay in touch with their members and even hold meetings with Zoom. I have been able to join nine of these wonderful chapter meetings either in person or via Zoom. I know it has been hard on those teaching everyday with so much of it on Zoom and then being asked to fit in a DKG meeting on Zoom. For many of our older members technology has been a challenge. Thank you to clever thinking chapter presidents and other members that have found ways to include them.

I have been meeting bi-monthly on Zoom with Debbie LeBlanc and other Northeast Regional Presidents (NERPs). Debbie is our Northeast Regional Director, who replaced Jane Tanner when her term expired last July. We have discussed issues relating to the pandemic and restrictions. Some states have held several statewide workshops and conventions, often spread over several days. I'm please to announce that Marjorie Sinclair of New Brunswick will be our Society representative for our Virtual Spring Convention. She is presently serving



on the DKG International Administrative Board as Area Representative Canada 2020-2022. She is also a member of the International Speakers Fund Committee and the International Issues Task Force. She is a member of DKG NB, Beta Chapter, co-editor of the DKG New Brunswick newsletter, Chickadee Chatter, a member of the Membership Committee, and one of the administrators of the DKG-New Brunswick Facebook page. As Area Representative she is dedicated to uniting the Canadian members in a shared sense of purpose and an awareness of the educational issues in Canada and fully supports the DKG

About those Achievement Award medallions...

When Maine S. O. annually awards our Alpha Psi Achievement Award, the recipient is presented with a gold medallion. As with much of our DKG jewelry, what happens when we pass on? Often, our jewelry is shared with "the next generation," and some of us even have that little card that instructs our families as such. That gold medallion is no exception.



What follows is a summary of an Executive Board vote taken late in 2011: 1) have the medallion be on loan, and upon the recipient's death, be returned to the state First Vice President, 2) have the name of the previous recipient "scrubbed" from the back and replaced with her initials, 3) have only the initials of the new recipient added, 4) reissue the medallions for as long as they can be used. All of this represents a financial savings AND the opportunity to honor the legacy of our recipients.

Over the course of the last ten years, there has been some confusion over this practice, and fortunately, I was able to find the original intentions outlined above. For the sake of clarity for all involved, the outcome of the 2011 vote will proposed as a standing rule when we next address the updates of our documents.

News from Second Vice President Priscilla McFarland

Marketing DKG and our Chapters

I am more than ready for spring! We have been teased by the intermittent warmer temperatures in the 30s and 40s only to get our hopes dashed by plunging subzero temperatures after a day or two. I plan to celebrate the actual arrival of spring by going for longer, more frequent hikes.

Spring is a time of renewal and revitalization, and what better way to do this for DKG and our chapters than to develop a comprehensive marketing plan? Marketing consists of all the actions taken to promote, advertise, or sell a product. It is a worthy and necessary endeavor to promote DKG and our individual chapters in order to grow and sustain ourselves.

I recently revisited the 2019 issue of *The Delta Kappa Gamma Bulletin: Collegial Exchange* (Volume 86-2) and the article "Exchanging Publicity for Marketing" from the DKG Communications and Marketing Committee. This committee changed the word "Publicity" in its name to "Marketing" in 2018 to "...expand...the purposes of communications about DKG and enhance... the Society's exposure, going beyond publicizing what we are doing to creating multiple impressions for a wider audience." Instead of only publicizing events and activities of your chapter after the fact, marketing is taking a proactive approach. You would market, or advertise, your event ahead of time to create increased interest and participation in it. You would then publicize how the event turned out soon after the fact. Publicity is a subset of marketing. But marketing DKG is not just about creating a buzz for our chapters' projects. We also need to get the word out about what DKG is.

The goal is name recognition for our organization and a positive impression of who we are and what we do. When DKG is more widely known to the general public, we should be able to get more support for our projects and more women interested in joining us.

The International website is a starting place for creating a plan to market DKG and your chapter. Go to dkg.org and sign in. Click on *Resources* and then *C & M Tools*. Then Click on *Marketing Graphics*. There you will see a printable bookmark or graphic that sums up DKG's mission and vision and who the women of DKG are. Click on *Marketing Ideas* and you will find many ways to improve your publicity efforts and to market our Society.

Under "Practices for Improving Publicity," it is suggested that you request to be put on the agenda of a school board meeting to award a scholarship from your chapter to a student. You could also create displays about DKG with brochures available and place them in libraries or other public places. Periodically, place a snack basket or tray of cookies with DKG brochures and chapter contact information in teachers' lounges in local schools.

Under "How is your chapter marketing the Society?" it is suggested that members visit schools and talk about DKG, spread DKG brochures around, talk about DKG to other organizations, hold ceremonies to honor outstanding educators, offer free professional development with contact hours, and invite guests (prospective members) to meetings. Many other ideas for publicity and marketing can be found in this resource.

The DKG brochure "A Journey for Life" may be printed off the International website (dkg.org) from the *Resources* tab or can be obtained for free from the DKG store on the website. You may also contact President Donna Kennison who may have a supply of these to give to you.

External marketing is making the world at large, or a specific, smaller target audience such as a Parent-Teacher group, aware of who and what DKG is. External marketing could be a concerted effort to have DKG and your chapter in the news on a regular basis. Publicize projects, scholarship opportunities, and your chapter's activities monthly, if possible. This could be done in newspapers, on social media such as Twitter, Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat, etc., and on radio or tv announcements. Don't forget about the tried and true use of elevator speeches. "The Go-To Guide (on the Resources tab of the International website) has a good sample elevator speech, or write your own based on your experiences as a DKG member." Each member in your chapter could make it a goal to give an elevator speech to a woman in education or any member of the public as a means of marketing, and perhaps recruiting.

Internal marketing is an effort to enlighten DKG members on the "...many benefits and opportunities..." available through our organization. The Emergency Fund, Scholarships, financial support for special projects, leadership training, conventions, Speakers Fund, and Schools for Africa are just a few topics about which your chapter's members may need more information. Members should also be educated about the bigger picture of DKG, including the 7 Purposes. A good resource to help in this effort is an article in the 2020 (Volume 87-2) issue of *Collegial Exchange* entitled "Exploring DKG Core Values." At a meeting of the 2019 DKGNext group, participants matched up the 7 Purposes of DKG and its mission statement to five core values: Collegiality, Philanthropy, Global Emphasis, Leadership, and Professional and Personal Growth. The article provides a description of each of these values which would be helpful in allowing members to formulate a deeper understanding of the 7 Purposes. The article could be used as a discussion starter at a chapter meeting and could serve as a means of assisting your chapter in planning activities that reflect the 7 Purposes.

All of the *Collegial Exchange* issues may be accessed on the International website under the *Publications* tab. It may be helpful to print out specific articles so each member has a copy to use in a chapter discussion.

I hope that individuals and chapters will step up your marketing efforts in the coming year.



When she retired in 2012 she served a two-year term as state president of the American Association of University Women, an organization that has supported women and girls since 1881. Presently, she is the first diversity and inclusion chair on the AAUW of Maine board.

For the first six years of her retirement, Betty-Jane was a member of the Board of Visitors at the University of Maine at Farmington, her alma mater, and where she met her husband, Dick, the men's basketball coach at UMF. 
